Has a friend or a family member ever asked you:

"Why do you go to church?"

If someone were to ask you:

"What do you believe about God?

Is He real?

Does it make a difference what you believe?"

How would you respond?

What would you say?

God's Word tells us:

"Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have" (1 Peter 3: 15)

So, what do you say to someone who asks you about the hope you have?
In other words, what's it all about?

The simple (and 100 % truthful!) answer is this

"Jesus Christ is Lord!"



Writing in the Large Catechism,
Martin Luther says, "Yes, the entire
Gospel (good news) that we
preach is based on this point
(Jesus Christ is Lord),
that we properly understand
this article as that
upon which our salvation
and all our happiness rests.
It is so rich and complete
that we can never learn it fully."

(Concordia: The Lutheran Confessions, CPH 2006, p.402)



Every Sunday we speak out loud what it is we believe about our Triune God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Most especially though, we confess, in short, concise words what we believe about Jesus Christ, the Second Person of the Holy Trinity.

These words can be an enormous help to us at all times, and particularly when asked by someone about our faith.

In the Large Catechism, Luther also has these helpful words of advice, "Now, if you are asked, 'What do you believe ... about Jesus Christ?' answer briefly, 'I believe that Jesus Christ, God's true Son, has become my Lord.' 'But what does it mean to become Lord?' 'It is this, He has redeemed me from sin, from the devil, from death, and from all evil....' 'The little word 'Lord' means simply the same as redeemer.'" (ibid., p. 400)

Everything else we confess about Jesus, what He did for us serve no other purpose than to explain how we are redeemed, we are purchased from sin, death, and the power of the devil through the person and work of Jesus Christ our Lord.

"Jesus Christ is Lord."

That's what it's all about. This is what we believe. This is what we confess.

This is what we teach.

This is what we hold most dear.

"Jesus Christ is Lord."

Simple enough for a child to believe, yet in the words of Luther,

"so rich and complete that we can never learn it fully"!

"But in your hearts <u>set apart Christ as Lord</u>. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect." 1 Peter 3:15 (NIV)

What's it all about? It's all about Jesus.
Jesus Christ is Lord! Thanks be to God!

I want to wish you a blessed Reformation Month, Although there are many stories and tales we can tell about the Reformation, I want to return to the roots. This is what the Reformation was about: it was not a rebellion or

1 CORINTHIANS 2: 1 - 5

"And I, when I came to you, brothers, did not come proclaiming to you the testimony of God with lofty speech or wisdom.

For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ and him crucified.

And I was with you in weakness and in fear and much trembling, and my speech and my message were not in plausible words of wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power, so that your faith might not rest in the wisdom of men but in the power of God."

Article IV of the Augsburg Confession



Furthermore, it is taught that we cannot obtain forgiveness of sin and righteousness before God through our merit, work,

or satisfactions, but that

we receive forgiveness of sin and become righteous before God out of grace for Christ's sake through faith when we believe that Christ has suffered for us and that for his sake our sin is forgiven and righteousness and eternal life are given to us.

For God will regard and reckon this faith as righteousness in his sight,

as St. Paul says in Romans 3:21–26 and 4:5.

the founding of a new church, but rather a return to Christ Jesus and His work for us. It is often said that Article IV of the Augsburg Confession is the article the Church stands upon: Christ crucified and risen for us. This is the only way we are able to have a good relationship with God, through Jesus' work for us. Our own wisdom is folly, our own works rubbish before God. It is only Christ and His work that have any merit. This is literally what "to reform" means: to return to a previous form. It is not a new creation, but it is to seek what God has declared and cling to His Word and promises alone.

Things around us constantly change; we see the leaves change color and fall and die as winter approaches. Loved ones leave and die, and new babies are born constantly. We might be tempted to think that the only thing that doesn't change is that things will change. But we must remember that God does not change. His Word is sure, and His promises for us endure. The Gospel, the Good News that Jesus lived and died for us, taking our place on the cross, is the same when St. Peter proclaimed it on Pentecost, the same in the days of the Reformation, and it is the same promise we receive today. This is our hope: Christ crucified and risen on the third day.



If you would like to learn more about this, we begin a Bible study on this topic during the Bible Study Hour on Sunday led by me. My promise to you is to always point to Christ and His work for you, not to anything else.

From the DCE Desk

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Together, as we strive to raise up the next generation of disciples, it is good to remember that youth ministry isn't all about programs or fellowship events—even though those things have their place. At the heart of a healthy, long-term youth ministry lies the relational and spiritual climate of the congregation itself. In the Seven Practices of Healthy Youth Ministry book, one of the foundational points is this: congregations should be communities of warmth, challenge, and grace.

- Warmth means showing Christ's love in personal, relational ways. It creates safe spaces where youth feel seen, known, cared for, and welcomed as part of the body of Christ. This is about showing Christ's love. It means welcoming youth (and visitors) generously into worship, study, and ministry. Warmth is not superficial friendliness, but depth of care: "congregations foster an open and honest environment where youth share joys, questions, crisis, and doubt, knowing God's Word will be spoken in love."
- <u>Challenge</u> means inviting youth to grow by grappling with life's difficult questions and deeper discipleship in general. Faith that is stretched and tested becomes faith that is strong. Youth need more than simple affirmation; they need encouragement to grow, to wrestle, to stretch their faith. A healthy youth ministry does not avoid hard questions or spiritual stretching; it leans into it. The practice encourages congregations to be "willing to engage in tough spiritual conversations."
- <u>Grace</u> is the Gospel lived out in humility and forgiveness. It reassures youth that even when they fail or stumble (not if...but when), they are loved and restored in Christ. In a culture of grace, failures are not hidden or condemned, but confessed, forgiven, and learned from. Congregations "share personal stories of grace, failure, and joy." Grace is the glue that holds warmth and challenge together—the assurance that even as we challenge youth to grow, we do so out of forgiveness, mercy, and God's patient love because that is how He deals with each of us.

Together, these three qualities form the foundation for trust, discipleship, and resilience in faith. Youth stay connected when they feel loved and known. A congregation that exudes warmth invites youth to stay connected even when life gets hard (again, when...not if). When they believe that they matter to the body of Christ, they are more likely to invest in long-term relationships, remain in worship, and stay engaged during the inevitable life transitions.

Youth mature when their faith is challenged. If we only comfort, never challenge, youth may never wrestle with real

issues of faith, sin, calling, and even suffering. If we only challenge, they may feel judged or defensive and withdraw running away from the very gifts God gives them in the Divine Service. Grace ensures that we challenge out of Gospel love, not legalism. The interplay helps them grow in maturity, resilience, and Christian identity.

Youth thrive when grace is the atmosphere of every relationship. To disciple someone, we must enter into their stories, their doubts, their questions. A warm, grace-rooted environment helps us earn the relational trust needed to walk with youth through the spiritual journey of questions, doubts, realizations, and joys. It also encourages authenticity—youth bring real doubts, real struggles, not only "Sunday best" versions of themselves.


Lastly, it shapes congregational culture, not just youth ministry alone. Warmth, challenge, and grace must flow through the whole congregation. Youth (and visitors) pick up on hypocrisy if the members behave otherwise. When the whole church family models those qualities (in worship, in small groups, in fellowship), youth/visitors see genuine Christian community lived out and are welcomed to be a part of it.

I invite our whole congregation to reflect on how we embody warmth, challenge, and grace—not only for our youth, but for one another too. By doing so, we will strengthen our ministry, support our families, and most importantly, point every generation to Jesus Christ, who is full of truth and grace. In the end, our goal is not merely a thriving youth program, but to see youth become lifelong disciples of Jesus—rooted in their Baptism, resilient in trials, active in their vocations, and living while loving their neighbors in word and deed. Warmth, challenge, and grace are not optional extras—they are essential foundations of that journey.

May God bless our efforts and empower us by His Spirit as we strive to be a congregation that truly lives out those three qualities, for not only the sake of our youth, but for the sake of His kingdom.

Church Council | September 18th

The Church Council reviewed, discussed, and approved the available minutes from each of the individual Boards at the September 18th meeting. Les Engelmann was approved to serve on the Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws Committee. Phone calls are now being made to members who have not signed up for a pictorial directory time slot. Annual Report has been compiled and the 2023-2024 fiscal year report was handed out at the September 29th Voters' meeting. The 2024-2025 report will be available for the last Voters' meeting of the year. The reports were not created previously due to absence of a Business Manager for portions of these years.

Christian Education Board | September 8th

Cradle Roll was updated and we evaluated how VBS went. Board of Deacons | September 4th

Finalized the 2026 worship schedule. Formed a Deacon/Elder sub-committee to support the 150th Anniversary Committee. FLC now has a YouTube channel for viewing recorded service in addition to the FB live stream.

Board of Evangelism | September 3rd

The 'Farm to School' Department of Agriculture grant monies are used to purchase locally grown and raised foods (beef, pork, poultry, eggs, vegetables, fruits) for our school lunch program.

Gardeners continue to be busy harvesting and preserving! The Farmers Market is a great place (Thursdays from 3-6) for picking up fresh produce. If you're fortunate to be blessed with friends who are gardeners/farmers, be sure to thank them for sharing their delicious bounty! Fellow Church members are also sharing – check the table at Main Entrance after Sunday services!





We held two Homegrown meals at FLS in September. At both meals, the students enjoyed Sweet Corn (from Seneca) that was dipped in sweet Butter (made from local cows). They also learned that late summer is a busy time for processing sweet corn. The workers at Seneca

work very hard and the factory operates 24 hours a day and 7 days a week. Some of the corn is preserved in cans and some is frozen in bags. By preserving it, we can enjoy delicious sweet corn all year round. Fun fact – a cob of corn has between 500-800 kernels!

The students also enjoyed Watermelon grown in a New Auburn garden. The melons were sweet and delicious and each weighed more than 25 lbs. Zucchini cakes were baked with Eggs from the Doug Schultz Farm and Zucchini



Squash from local gardens. It was fun for the students to taste-



test Cucamelons, Lemon Cucumbers, and Apple Cider purchased from the Glencoe Farmers Market. Shimanski Orchard in Silver Lake has been supplying us with delicious Apples and Pears!. There were so many good and healthy items to eat!

Both paper and digital versions are accepted.




"Mat-Saturday" October 11




