
Malachi: Using God's Gifts for God's Glory

How often does apathy get in the way of our walk with Jesus? Apathy is a compound of two Greek words that literally means, "No passion." We all know the feeling—the days when our get up and go has got up and went. Then what happens? We don't manage God's gifts—especially His gifts of money and investments—for His glory and the spread of His Gospel.

Here are the sermon themes as we make our way through Malachi:


 $\underline{\text{Week One:}}$ Looking in the right places makes faithful stewards (Nov. $9^{\text{th}})$


Week Two: God gets our attention so we bring Him righteous offerings (Nov. 16th)

From Assistant Pastor, Michael Ewert

Recently, I started a sermon with several first lines from popular books, The Hobbit, Pride and Prejudice, A Tale of Two Cities, Moby Dick, and The Bible. I also said that we are a people of stories. However, the Bible is not just another story; it is the Story of Everything! Dr. Joel Okamoto wrote an article that I had to read several times while at Seminary, "The Word of the Cross and the Story of Everything." In it, he explains the need for Christians to see and analyze their own Story of Everything, because he says, "This is about everything. But everything is up for grabs." (53)

But before I get too far ahead of myself, what even is a Story of Everything? It is an account that a person uses to explain the fundamental questions of the universe, such as Why do we exist?, What is our purpose? Why do bad things happen?, or even What job should I pursue?, all the way down to What should I eat for supper? Every person has such an account, even if they don't think about it. But as Christians Dr. Okamoto is "proposing it on behalf of all of us. This is not merely Okamoto's idea. I am proposing it as ours. This is something public, something catholic, and something objective." (53) This is not just each individual's account, but as Christians we are united as the Body of Christ. So the Christian Story of Everything is ours together.

You might ask, "Why is this so Important?" Dr. Okamoto answers, "We need to consider our account of everything, because we live in times when everything is up for grabs." (53) We now live in a pluralistic society, meaning people who live together no longer automatically agree on everything. There has been a loss of cohesion in our county. Fundamental truths that the church and Christians took for granted are no longer assumed by our neighbors. Do God, truth, morals, or beauty even exist?

Today, you will get 50 different answers. But Christianity also has to compete with other accounts of everything, "Accounts of everything include different religions—Christianity, Hinduism, and Buddhism — and different philosophies— idealism, materialism and scientism." (53) Each provides explanations that don't operate well with Christianity. But our neighbors will be familiar with them, and so we need to explain why they should hear the Story.

So what is the Christian Story of Everything? We hear it from the Bible, although the Bible does not lay it out by saying, The Christian Story of everything is... Dr. Okamoto begins by pointing out that "'everything' means 'God and Creation.'" (54) The story tells us of God and then His creation and His interaction with it. But is also answers questions of "'Who is God?' and 'Why did Jesus die?'" (54)

The Story of Everything tells us of God's Love for His creation from Adam and Eve, to Abraham, the Israelites, and up to Us! It culminates in the Gospel, the ultimate showing of God's Love for us through Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. (Which we are also learning more about in our Sunday Morning Bible Study) "God makes himself known and God works out all things in and through Jesus of Nazareth...In his day, Jesus insisted. He didn't back down. So he was rejected, and he was crucified." (63) But then it continues as we see God's love for us today as Christians. And this means "Our entire identity as Christians and everything that we are in our lives are implicated with Jesus Christ and him crucified." (64) Everything is put in place for us only through the Cross. Then we can share the Story of Everything and explore its answers together with all people. Dr. Okamoto concludes

"Jesus" is the key to all our answers, as he always has been. But how are we to preach, teach, and understand him today? The crucifixion of Jesus is the key for understanding, believing, proclaiming, and teaching his identity as the Son of God and his mission to redeem and rule over God's people and over all God's creation. He came to redeem all God had made. It had gone wrong when evil and sin and death entered the world. But God resolved to make all things new. Through Jesus, God did. (65)

My prayer for you is that you spend more time reading, hearing, and sharing the Story of Everything. That you know God's love for you, his beloved creation.

From the DCE Desk

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

This month we continue our look into the 7 Practices of Healthy Youth Ministry. Last month, we focused on being a congregation of Warmth, Challenge, and Grace. This month, we turn to the second vital component—Supportive Adults.

Every youth ministry is, at its heart, about helping young people grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord, Jesus Christ. While the structure may differ from congregation to congregation, the need for supportive adults is universal. LCMS Youth Ministry's research shows that "supportive congregations seek to connect every youth with at least five engaged Christian adults." These adults intentionally invest in long-term, intergenerational relationships and respond to life's celebrations, transitions, and crises. Five adults per youth may seem ambitious, but the impact is life changing.

What does it mean to be a *supportive adult?* It begins with intentional relationships. Supportive adults go beyond attending events or "chaperoning." They are present, accessible, and listen deeply—walking alongside youth through joys, questions, doubts, and major decisions. As LCMS Youth Ministry puts it: "Chaperones desire to protect, discipline, and control. Supportive adults desire to build relationships, disciple, listen, and observe."

Supportive adults come from every generation. They are not only parents, but members of all ages who invest in discipling youth—engaging in faith conversations, praying with them, and helping them see how their Baptism, Christ's forgiveness, and a life of service shape who they are. These adults help every young person know they are seen, known, and valued in Christ. As The Lutheran Witness notes, "Youth ministry helps root youth and surrounds them with adults who point them back to Jesus."

Supportive adults also prepare to walk with youth through all seasons—transitions from school to school, moves, crises, and joyful milestones like confirmation, mission trips, or first jobs. As the book 7 Practices of Healthy Youth Ministry reminds us, youth ministry is grounded in Scripture and Lutheran theology: God entrusts young people to the care of His Church, where Baptism places them in Christ's Body for lifelong sanctification. Research affirms that strong adult-to-youth relationships help to build lasting faith identity, church connection, and resilience in the face of trials and suffering.


This practice matters in every congregation, large or small. The Lutheran Witness reminds us, "If you have even one teen in a congregation, there is youth ministry." Our youth should not exist in a silo—they should see adults worshiping, serving, and praying alongside them; engaging with them in the work of the church, not simply tolerating their presence. Adults must engage with youth as partners in ministry, not distant observers.

It's often said, "It takes a village to raise a child." Parents aren't meant to do this alone. We, as the Church, are called to form a network of adult Christ-followers who invest in and encourage our young people.

The phrase Supportive Adults might sound simple, but it carries deep weight. Everything we do flows from the Gospel—through Baptism, we are joined to Christ's death and resurrection and given new life. When youth see this Gospel lived out in the adults around them, they are more likely to carry that faith forward for a lifetime straight into eternity.

Here at First Lutheran, may we commit to being that kind of community—a place where our young people are not only seen and known, but championed in their life in Christ.

Church Council | October 16th

The Church Council reviewed, discussed, and approved the available October minutes from each of the individual Boards at the October 16th meeting. Trunk or Treat will have an entry area greeted by Evangelism Board members, handing out a newly created church brochure. Plans are moving ahead to replace the school kitchen flooring. Reviewed financial trends, which indicate giving went down while ministry/staff vacancies were present. At this time, all vacancies other than part-time business manager have been filled; but member contributions have not gone up. Means to bridge the gap in revenue until contributions trend upward, were discussed.

Christian Education Board | October 13th

All of the members present learned about the procedure for taking care of the Cradle Roll and it was updated. Topics for discussion included: Council Report, November Ignite!, Trunk or Treat plans, Advent preparations with the theme "Every Heart Prepare," Sunday School gifts, Confirmation crosses, Mission Trip plans, 150th Anniversary update, Ladies' ParTEA, Children's Christmas Ornament gift, 150 Community Service ideas, and the Youth app.

Day School | October 7th

Fire Safety Month was celebrated by either students going to the fire department or the fire department coming to the school to visit with the students. The Mission Central Trip is coming up at the of the month for the 7th and 8th graders. The Annual School Marathon has wrapped up. Over \$28,000 was raised for the school.

Board of Deacons | October 2nd

Discussed updated computer systems proposal for Pastors and office staff. Starting to fill 4 th the quarter deacon's schedule. Determined attendees for October circuit forum.

Board of Evangelism | October 1st





HARMONIOUS STEWARDSHIP

"For as in one body we have many members, and the members do not all have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another" (Romans 12:4-5).

One of the most forgotten concepts in stewardship is the interdependent nature that makes up the Body of Christ and the way that body supports the shared work of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This is experienced in the local congregation, as well as in broader mission and ministry efforts at the district and Synod levels. Yet in these words, St. Paul reminds the Romans and us that we are indeed members of one another. This is true in our worship. It is also true in our stewardship of the Gospel. Stewards of all shapes and sizes, ages and abilities, affluence and influence are all assembled around Word and Sacrament in the local congregation with no one being more important than the other.

Part of this forgetting lies in what the eyes see and how our human mind operates. Our eyes and our minds are quick to come to the erroneous conclusion that the person who writes the biggest check is the more important steward. Human logic, flawed by sin as it is, could make a claim that the youngest child or the most infirm, aged member of the congregation would certainly be considered something less than important when it comes to the stewardship of the Gospel.

Paul makes it clear in these words that this is not how stewardship of the Gospel is measured in the Body of Christ. Rather, it would be better to view local stewardship like the lost art of harmony in congregational singing. This has been lost not only due to the performative nature of the lead singers of the local praise team, but also because modern hymnals are written to almost force the novice hymn-singer into unison voice. Creative harmonization by talented organists is beautiful to listen to, but does not always support the people in the pews in singing in parts. This is a loss in demonstrating a very practical aspect of whole-body stewardship.



The sound that builds when choral and congregational singers settle into their voice parts is nothing short of heavenly! Yet when altos, tenors and bass sing their individual parts without any concept of how they fit together, the music doesn't sound as

powerful. The narrow range of the typical alto line almost sounds monotonous. The tenor line can get painfully high, and the base line can get uncomfortably low. But, when interdependently entwined, along with the melody that is so often carried by the sopranos, the music becomes a tremendously powerful tool in communicating the Gospel.

The same is true of individual stewards. Certainly, stewards with more financial means are in a unique place to "carry the tune" for ministry in a local congregation. But that doesn't rule out the faithful stewardship of the saint-like 94-year-old Hulda, who prayed for her young pastor in German every night while the aches and pains of arthritis and the grief of losing a daughter to cancer kept her awake. This does not rule out Jimmy, the profoundly developmentally disabled confirmand whose basic but dramatically eloquent confession of the faith left an impression on a congregation long after he went to be with Jesus. It doesn't rule out the single parent, the recovering addict, the family coming out of bankruptcy, the elderly widow and everyone in between.



The Lord has entrusted all the baptized with stewardship of the one thing needful: the Gospel of Jesus Christ. No one member of any congregation is more important than another when it comes to this stewardship. The biggest check isn't always the best way to communicate the Gospel. In fact, it is

almost always better communicated with the widow's mite, the tenacious stewardship of the talents and so much more.

In the local congregation and beyond, our corporate stewardship of the Gospel needs each other to fill out our great confession. It is not about equal amount. It is about interdependence that only the Holy Spirit can work! **Each of us has a role to play, a harmony to sing.** The standard for that role is faithfulness. We do not have the same function, but we have the same Jesus! As we sing the parts entrusted to us by the Holy Spirit, the sweet music of the Gospel goes out!
